## Second Sunday of Easter - 7 April 2024.

### A reflection on the relation between the Good Friday and Easter Sunday

I was graced to be able to attend World Youth Day last year on the group going through Israel. The trip was frantic, going from place to place, but one of the most anticipated stops for me was Christ's tomb towards the end. The day came, and I was devastated; I had woken up unwell. I ended up staying in my room while my group walked the real-life stations of the cross and visited the place where Christ conquered death and rose from the dead. Despite saying I was fine about it, I was bitter and annoyed; the timing of this cross was terrible. I wallow in my own misery for a few days, and I mostly recover, and the final day of our stay comes upon us. We got an announcement that we had an hour or two free time before we had to leave, and some of my fellow bus members came up to me and told me to come with them, that we would follow in the footsteps of Peter and John and run to the tomb. They had told me how amazing the stations and visit to the tomb were, even in the twenty seconds they were allowed to be in there due to the sheer number of people, and they didn't want me to miss out. I figured it would be far too busy to get in and come back in time, but I followed anyway.

We walk by most of the stations on the way, and they tell me of the aggression they encountered along the way by non-believers shouting at them and spitting, a small experience of what Christ endured at those very same places. We arrive, and we enter the absolutely massive church built around the tomb. We are drawn up these stairs by the sound of beautiful chanting. We came to the very spot of Calvary where a group of Orthodox was praying morning prayer, and they kindly invited us to join them. We sit and bask in the beautiful chanting and reverence of the place where our Lord died, and then remember that we don't have much time to get back, and we still need to see if we can get into the tomb. We hurried down and went around expecting a long line, but to our amazement, there was a break in the people, and it was immediately available. We pull aside a priest, and he welcomes us into the tomb. As I enter, expecting twenty seconds like everyone else got, he tells me I can have two minutes. I knelt at the holy place, contemplating how this had played out. I contemplated how getting sick, which I thought ruined my experience of the end of our pilgrimage, actually gave me a greater and more peaceful experience of this most holy place.


This is how God works; we think that everything needs to go well, that it needs to go precisely to plan for things to be good, but God's ways are not our ways, nor are his thoughts our thoughts. It is precisely through the cross that he works his greatest good, and this is no different in our lives. So, I invite you on this day to view your crosses in a different light and trust that, even if you can't see it now, something good is going to come from it because he has promised to work all things for good for those who love Him (Rom 8:28).

Help stop the 'equality' bill

NSW Parliament will soon be debating a bill tabled by Alex Greenwich MP. While marketed as an 'equality' bill, the bill will have disastrous impacts on vulnerable women and children, as well as for faith communities.
